Background

- \$11.14 billion general obligation bond authorized as part of 2009 comprehensive Delta Reform Act for placement on 2010 ballot
- Rescheduled to 2012 election by Legislature due to general economic conditions
- Moved to 2014 by Legislature due to competing measures and continued concerns with state economy

2013/14 Legislative Session

- Concerns raised with overall size of bond
 - Public statements by Governor Brown, Senate President pro Tempore Steinberg and Assembly Speaker Pérez, among others
- Four new bill introductions
 - SB 36 (Rubio, D-East Bakersfield)
 - SB 40 (Pavley, D-Agoura Hills)
 - SB 42 (Wolk, D-Davis)
 - AB 142 (Perea, D-Fresno)

Recommended Water Bond Priorities

- Top Priority:
 - Fund state share of public benefits to support coequal goals of water supply reliability and Delta restoration including:
 - Habitat restoration beyond mitigation obligations of any party or interest;
 - Projects must be consistent with BDCP; and
 - No local matching funds required.

Recommended Water Bond Priorities

- Delta Sustainability
 - Fund public benefits associated with Delta sustainability projects including:
 - Flood protection;
 - Water quality improvements;
 - Other "stressors" (e.g. invasive species, predator control, unscreened diversions); and
 - Require local matching funds as appropriate.

Recommended Water Bond Priorities

- Water Supply Reliability
 - Fund multi-benefit projects to reduce future reliance on imported supplies:
 - Projects that require public incentives to be locally costeffective;
 - Require local matching funds as appropriate;
 - Eligible projects in urban areas would include: conservation, recycling, groundwater remediation, storm water and desalination;
 - Eligible projects in agricultural areas would include onfarm efficiency and system improvements;

Recommended Water Bond Priorities

- Water Supply Reliability (cont'd)
 - Provide special consideration for disadvantaged communities; and
 - Provide start-up funds for low-interest revolving loan program as proposed in AB 1349 (Gatto, D-Silver Lake).

Recommended Water Bond Priorities

- Statewide system improvements
 - Fund public benefits associated with surface and groundwater storage;
 - Eligible projects must meet public benefit criteria as required under 2009 bond measure;
 - Funds awarded on competitive basis; and
 - Require local matching funds as appropriate.

Board Options

- Option 1
 - Adopt CEQA determination
 - Adopt Metropolitan's 2014 water bond priorities as recommended
- Option 2
 - Adopt CEQA determination
 - Take no position on 2014 water bond priorities
