
## Lake Powell Pipeline (LPP) Project

- 140 mile underground pipeline Lake Powell in Page, Arizona to Sand Hollow Reservoir in Washington County, Utah
- 86,249 AF water Utah reserved for the Project
- Intended to serve Washington County Water Conservancy District in Southern Utah

#### LPP – Purpose and Revenue Sources

- LPP proposal seeks to provide communities in Southern Utah with:
  - Additional source of supply currently served by a single source, the Virgin River system
  - Supply for projected population growth through 2060
- Proposed sources of revenue:
  - Impact fees on new development
  - Water rates
  - Property taxes

## LPP Project Background

- 2006 Utah legislature passes the Lake Powell Pipeline Development Act, directing the Utah Board of Water Resources (UBWR) to construct the LPP
- 2008 UBWR applies for a FERC permit to construct LPP. FERC begins NEPA process
- 2019 UBWR removes large hydropower component of the LPP proposal and withdraws application for FERC license. Requests DOI assume responsibility for NEPA compliance
- June 2020 US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR) publishes Draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)
- September 2020 UBWR requests USBR extend time to respond to Basin States' request to resolve legal and operational concerns

#### **UBWR's Tentative LPP Schedule**

- 2021-2022 Environmental Impact Statement
- 2022 Record of Decision
- Mid 2020s Project design and financing
- Late 2020s Construction

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#### Utah's Colorado River Water Rights

- Colorado River Compact Upper Basin 7.5 million AF/YR Allocation
- Upper Colorado River Compact Utah's right to annually divert and use 23% of native flow in the Upper Basin
- Future Contract with the USBR would allow Utah to deplete releases from Flaming Gorge Dam
- State water rights decrees

#### Comments on Draft EIS

- Thousands of comments submitted during the public comment period
- Comments submitted by Tribes, NGOs, water users, the Colorado River Basin States and members of the public
- Metropolitan interests represented in letters
  - Six Basin States
  - Colorado River Board of California
  - Metropolitan letter

#### Colorado River Basin States Comment Letter

Six Colorado River Basin States (AZ, CA, NV, CO, WY and NM) asked DOI to refrain from issuing a Final EIS and Record of Decision until the seven Basin States and DOI are able to reach consensus regarding legal and operational concerns raised by the proposed LPP project

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#### Colorado River Board Comment Letter

- Joined the six Basin States letter on behalf of California
- Noted that the draft EIS did not adequately analyze impacts:
  - Proposed UBWR/USBR contract Lake Powell Pipeline Project Block Water Exchange
  - Operations Lake Powell and Lake Mead
  - Return Flow Accounting Virgin River
  - Water quality downstream of Lake Mead

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### Metropolitan's Comment Letter

- Supported six Colorado River Basin States comment letter
- Noted that the draft EIS did not adequately analyze impacts to:
  - Downstream water quality and supply
  - Lake Powell and Lake Mead operations
  - Cumulative effects

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## Schedule and Next Steps

- UBWR is working to address concerns raised by stakeholders in public comments to the draft EIS, including the Basin States
- USBR has not yet responded to the UBWR request for new time line to complete environmental compliance
- USBR's new time line would likely establish a schedule for a supplemental EIS, followed by a Record of Decision

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
